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## Overview

The 2018 Point-In-Time Homeless Count and Survey (PIT Count) is the result of the commitment of county agencies, city municipalities, non-profit service providers and volunteers, including those experiencing homelessness. The annual count interview survey is the primary source of population data collected countywide on individuals and families that are literally homeless (i.e., living on the streets, in vehicles, or in emergency shelters and transition housing).

Riverside County is the fourth largest county in California and ranks tenth largest in the United States. The 2018 PIT Count shows that people experiencing homelessness comprise less than one percent (.10%) of the total population of Riverside County, based on an estimated population in 2017 of 2,433,266 (U.S. Census). The 2018 PIT Count conducted on January 23, 2018, identified **1,685**

The 2018 unsheltered count methodology consisted of a street-based count, service-based count, and a homeless outreach count conducted by law enforcement teams led by the Riverside County Sheriff's Department and Riverside University Health System - Behavioral Health homeless outreach teams. A total of **486** volunteers were deployed across Riverside County to successfully count and survey the unsheltered homeless population. Compared to the 2017 PIT Count, the number of unsheltered people experiencing homelessness **increased by 2.9% in 2018 from 1638 to 1,685**. Among the 1,685 unsheltered individuals counted in 2018, 1,239 were interviewed and 446 were observed.

The sheltered count methodology consisted of data extracted from the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) to identify sheltered homeless individuals on the night of January 22, 2018. Compared to the 2017 PIT Count, the number of sheltered homeless people **decreased by 17.8% in 2018 from 768 to 631**.

The total number of individuals experiencing homelessness primarily reflects an increase in the unsheltered population from 2016 to 2018.

However, sheltered homelessness has continued to decrease from 2016 to 2018. Table 1 illustrates the increasing number of unsheltered homeless people relative to the decreasing number of sheltered homeless people.

### **Sheltered Count Decrease**

The decrease in the 2018 Sheltered PIT Count from 2017 may be attributed to the decrease in the number of homeless people staying in emergency shelter (ES) or transitional housing (TH) on the night of the PIT Count. Table 1A below is a break-out of the total number of *sheltered* people compared to the total number of available beds for each housing type in 2017 and 2018. The total number of available beds increased by more than one percent (1.56%) from 2017 (n=834) to 2018 (n=847). However, the sheltered PIT Count number decreased by almost eighteen percent (17.8%) from 2017 (n=786) to 2018 (n=631) indicating that the decrease in the sheltered count was most likely due to a lower bed utilization.

### **Unsheltered Count Increase**

The slight increase in Riverside County's *unsheltered* homeless population (3%) is trending with other Southern California counties that have also experienced increases in 2018 (and in 2017), including neighboring San Bernardino County.

The number of chronically homeless individuals increased by 13.49% from 2017 (n=341) to 2018 (n=387). Those who reported drug use increased by 5.42% from 2017 (n=461) to 2018 (486); PTSD increased by 11.94% from 2017 (n=268) to 2018 (n=300); and physical disability increased by 11.33% from 2017 (n=362) to 2018 (n=403).

## PIT Count Findings Summary

### Overall Count

- Identified **1,685 unsheltered** and **631 sheltered** homeless people (**total = 2,316**) in Riverside County, California. **The total PIT Count decreased by 3.7% from 2017 to 2018.**

- Unsheltered PIT Count numbers have continued to decline since 2013 with the exception of a 21.2% increase in 2017 and a slight 2.9% increase in 2018. Overall, Riverside County has decreased total homelessness by more than half (52%) from 2005 to 2018.
- Unsheltered PIT Count **increased by 2.9% from 2017 (n=1638) to 2018 (n=1685).**
- Total unsheltered count of all cities that experienced an increase during the 2018 PIT Count increased by 40.38% from 2017 (n=525) to 2018 (n=737).
- Total unsheltered count of all county communities increased by 235.71% from 2017 (n=14) to 2018 (n=47).

#### Supervisorial Districts

- District 1 **increased by 1%** from 2017 (n=288) to 2018 (n=291) representing 17.30% of the total unsheltered homeless counted during the 2018 PIT Count.
- District 2 **increased by 4%** from 2017 (n=393) to 2018 (n=409) representing 24.30% of the total unsheltered homeless people counted during the 2018 PIT Count.
- District 3 **decreased by 16%** from 2017 (n=256) to 2018 (n=214) representing 12.70% of the total unsheltered homeless people counted during the 2018 PIT Count.
- District 4 **decreased by 6%** from 2017 (n=528) to 2018 (n=494) representing 29.30% of the total unsheltered homeless people counted during the 2018 PIT Count.

- District 5 **increased by 55%** from 2017 (n=173) to 2018 (n=268) representing 16.0% of the total unsheltered homeless people counted during the 2018 PIT Count.
- District 4 reports the largest portion (29.30%) of unsheltered homeless as compared to the total 2018 Unsheltered PIT Count (n=1685).

### ***Reasons for Becoming Homeless***

- Two most common reasons cited for becoming homeless is lack of income for housing (34%) and unemployment (31%) with significantly more (34%) individuals reporting lack of income in 2018 than in 2017.
- More than half (67%) of unsheltered homeless individuals are men (n = 1131) and one-third (29%) of these individuals are female (n=488).

### ***Race and Ethnicity***

- More than half (55%) of unsheltered homeless individuals are White (n=934), while one in ten (13%) individuals are Black or African Americans (n=216).
- Only one percent (1.13%) of unsheltered homeless individuals are Asian (n=19), while six percent (6.11%) are American Indian or Alaska Native (n=103) and nearly two percent (1.54%) are Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander (n=26).
- Three race groups with the largest increases from 2017 to 2018 are Asian (90%), American Indian or Alaska Native (16%) and Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander (30%).
- In terms of ethnicity, almost one in three homeless individuals is Hispanic or Latino.

### ***Age***

- Number of unsheltered homeless children under the age of 18 decreased by 73.33% from 2017 (n=15) to 2018 (n=4).
- Unsheltered homeless senior age range 70-79 increased by 84.62% from 2017 (n=13) to 2018 (n=24).
- More than ten percent (11%) of unsheltered homeless individuals are considered homeless youth under the age of 25 (n = 181) using HUD's "literally homeless" definition.
- Almost twenty percent (18%) of homeless adults are age 62 or higher - an 18% increase from 2017 (n=123) to 2018 (n=145).

### ***Veterans***

- Six percent (6%) of unsheltered homeless individuals reported to be veterans (n=99).
- Two percent (2%) of the self-reported veterans were chronically homeless (n=33) and two percent (2%) also reported receiving benefits (n=30).

### **Additional Subpopulations**

- Number of chronically homeless individuals increased by more than thirteen percent (13.49% from 2017 (n=341) to 2018 (n=387).
- Number of homeless individuals who reported drug use increased by more than five percent (5.42%) from 2017 (n=461) to 2018 (486).
- Number of homeless individuals that have experienced PTSD increased by nearly twelve percent (11.94%) from 2017 (n=268) to 2018 (n=300).
- Number of homeless individuals that have a physical disability increased by 11.33% from 2017 (n=362) to 2018 (n=403).
- In 2018, HUD revised the domestic violence survey question to capture current domestic violence (DV) as opposed to past occurrences of DV which were allowed in previous years. This change may possibly account for the 65.60% decrease from 2017 (n=282) to 2018 (n=97).
- Thirteen percent (13%) of homeless individuals (n=160) reported being released from jail or prison within the past 90 days. Of this population, over five (5.12%) percent (n=63) were released said they were released on probation and more than 1 percent (1.06%) (n=13) were released on parole.
- More than nine percent (9.12%) of homeless individuals (n=112) reported being released from jail or prison within the past 12 months. Of this population, less than three percent (2.76%) (n=34) were released on probation and less than 1 percent (.41%) (n=5) were released on parole.

### **Sheltered Count**

- Number of sheltered homeless people **decreased by 17.8% in 2018 from 768 to 631.**
- Subpopulations that experienced the most significant count decreases were mental health problems (29.13%), veterans (35.09%), substance users (10.16%), and minor youth (10.91%).
- In 2018, HUD revised the domestic violence survey question to capture current domestic violence (DV) as opposed to past occurrences of DV which were allowed in previous years. This change could possibly account for the **82.61% decrease from 2017 (n=115) to 2018 (n=20).**

# INTRODUCTION

The PIT Count is a count and survey of Riverside County’s sheltered and unsheltered homeless population. Riverside County’s Department of Public Social Services (DPSS), in partnership with the County of Riverside Continuum of Care, is required to conduct this biennial count during the last 10 days in January. The Continuum of Care (CoC) is a network of private- and public-sector homeless service providers, designed to promote community-wide planning and the strategic use of resources to address homelessness. In 2015, the county began to conduct the PIT Count annually.

The PIT Count is federally-mandated by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to count and survey the homeless population in cities and counties throughout the nation, including Riverside County. Each count is planned, coordinated, and carried out locally. Data collected during the PIT Count reflects a *snapshot* of Riverside County’s homeless population at one particular point-in-time and is required in order to: continue receiving federal funding for homeless assistance programs, develop strategies to end homelessness, help homeless individuals and families who are in need, and produce a full report to HUD regarding the homeless individuals in Riverside County. In 2017, Riverside City and County received a total of **\$9,978,890** from HUD for the Continuum of Care Program for homeless programs and services.

HUD defines a person who is homeless as: (a) living in a place not designed or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for humans (i.e., abandoned buildings, cars, parks, under bridges, bus stops, etc.); and (b) living in emergency shelters and transitional housing projects<sup>1</sup>. It is important to note that HUD’s definition does not include households that are below the poverty line or those individuals that are near-homeless. In addition, HUD identifies people to exclude from the count<sup>2</sup>:

- (a) Persons counted in any location not listed on the CoC’s Housing Inventory Count (HIC);
- (b) Persons residing in permanent housing (PH) programs, including persons housed using HUD Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (VASH) vouchers;
- (c) Persons temporarily staying with family or friends (i.e., “doubled-up” or “couch surfing”);
- (d) Persons residing in housing they rent or own (i.e., permanent housing), including persons residing in rental housing with assistance from a RRH project on the night of the count; and
- (e) Persons residing in institutions (e.g., jails, juvenile correction facilities, foster care, hospital beds, detox centers).

# METHODOLOGY

## Overview

The 2018 PIT Count unsheltered methodology consisted of the following primary components:

- a) Street-based count on January 23, 2018 between 5:30 a.m. to 9:30 a.m.
- b) Service-based count on January 23, 2018 between 7:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.
- c) Follow-up Count and Survey during the seven day post-count window (City and County staff, volunteers, Riverside County Sheriff's deputies and Behavioral Health (RUHS-BH) Homeless Outreach teams (between January 23, 2018 and January 29, 2018 to count and survey homeless individuals in cities and unincorporated areas missed on January 23, 2018)).
- d) Unaccompanied Youth (age 24 and under) street-based and service-based counts between January 23, 2018 and January 26, 2018 (four-day period of time to cover targeted unaccompanied youth homeless locations).

The 2018 PIT Count unsheltered methodology was similar to the 2017 PIT Count unsheltered methodology. See Table 3 below for a comparison of PIT Count methodology.

Subsequent sections will further compare the 2017 and 2018 PIT Count unsheltered methodologies. In both 2017 and 2018, specific attention was given to city engagement and survey development as opportunities to increase the accuracy of the PIT Count.

## City Engagement

The methods of city engagement used in 2018 paralleled the methods used in 2017. DPSS made efforts to engage City Leaders, law enforcement personnel, and establish deployment centers in each city. A thorough list of unincorporated communities was included in the street-based count. City Leaders who requested further assistance were assigned a DPSS Site Coordinator to support PIT Count activities on the day of the PIT Count. These DPSS Site Coordinators worked in tandem with City Leaders. Their role was primarily to assist the City Leaders who were in charge at each deployment center during the street-based count. It is important to note that some City Leaders elected not to use a DPSS Site Coordinator as they felt confident with their abilities and available resources to conduct the count. In 2018, nearly half (44%) of the deployment centers had an assigned DPSS Site Coordinator, an increase from 2017 (30%). See Table 4 below for a comparison of city and community engagement.

## Survey Development

The 2018 survey tools that were selected for implementation were a slightly improved version of the 2017 tools. The survey tools were revised based on the feedback from volunteers as well as data quality improvements (See Appendix A). The following survey tools were used during the 2018 PIT Count:

- 1) Unsheltered Street Count and Survey tool (interview and observational)
- 2) Youth Unsheltered Street Count and Survey tool – Interview
- 3) Youth Unsheltered Street Count and Survey tool - Observational

### *Interview Survey Tools*

In 2018, an additional interview survey was used for the Youth Count. The Youth Interview Survey incorporates most of the information included on the traditional PIT Count survey tool along with additional questions targeted specifically to homeless youth.

A total of 40 people piloted the survey tools, including: DPSS Adult Services Division Homeless Programs staff, community members, and sheltered homeless individuals. In addition, general survey feedback was given by the Riverside University Health System – Behavioral Health (RUHS-BH) staff. The version that received the most positive feedback was selected for interviewing homeless individuals during the street-based count and the service-based count.

### *Observational Survey Tools*

The primary goal for the PIT Count was to *interview* each homeless person. However, it was understood an interview was not feasible under certain circumstances. Thus, an observational survey tool was developed to allow interviewers to record observational data (i.e., perceived gender, ethnicity, age, physical description, etc.) for individuals encountered during the street-based count who were suspected to be homeless and were unable or unwilling to be engaged. This observational technique is allowable according to HUD guidelines<sup>3</sup>.

The following are acceptable reasons for volunteers to use an observational tool:

- there were barriers to enter the site
- the site was unsafe to enter
- the person refused to participate
- the person was sleeping
- there was a language barrier
- the person was unable to respond (i.e., mental issues, intoxication, etc.)

This observational tool was used during the general street-based PIT Count. In 2018, an additional observational survey was used for the Youth Count. The youth observational survey tool incorporates most of the information included on the traditional PIT Count survey tool along with additional questions targeted specifically toward homeless youth.

### **Data Entry and Deduplication Method**

A Microsoft Access application with built-in data validations was created in order to consolidate and store the unsheltered homeless count survey data. Separate applications were created for the street-based interview surveys and street-based observational surveys to accommodate for the differences in the questions. Five staff members from the PIT Lead team entered collected unsheltered homeless data into the Microsoft Access application between the months of February and March 2018.

Since the 2018 PIT Count involved street-based counts, service-based counts, and a follow-up count during the seven-day post-count window, a deduplication method was implemented to account for any individuals who may have been interviewed multiple times. The deduplication method for the interview surveys consisted of creating a unique identifier using several fields of information from the survey, such as: first initial, last initial, birth month, birth year, city born, state born, gender, race, and veteran status. The deduplication method for the observational surveys used the following fields to create a unique identifier: reason for observational tool, type of location, age observed, perceived gender, and perceived race. The creation of the unique identifier was conducted in a statistical database program (Microsoft Access), using an algorithm with the identified demographic information to generate a unique ID for each individual counted. This process allowed data analysts to easily identify and eliminate duplicate records.

Table 3 below shows a total of **1,797** street-based (interview and observational tools) and service-based interview surveys returned to DPSS (**1,186 interview, 189 youth surveys, 422 observational**). However, during the data entry process, several survey errors were discovered.

**Surveys were rejected prior to data entry for the following reasons:** (a) the survey was completely blank except for interviewer name and location; (b) the homeless individual indicated that they stayed in a place the night before that was not considered *unsheltered* according to HUD (house, apartment, emergency shelter, motel, etc.); or (c) the homeless individual indicated they had already been surveyed.

There were 98 surveys that were rejected and therefore were not entered into the database. These criteria resulted in a new subtotal of 1,699 surveys. The PIT Count's analytic rationale was to include all records until there was clarity and certainty that they should be excluded. Once all data was entered and the deduplication method implemented, 14 surveys were rejected as duplicates, resulting in a final sample size of 1,685 individuals. See Table 5 below for the numeric breakdown and filtering process.

Since the observational surveys contained less information and therefore fewer fields to use in the deduplication process, it was more challenging to eliminate *potential* duplicates in this data. For



example, if two different volunteers were instructed to record their observations regarding the same scenario, they would likely describe the scenario in two completely different ways. Thus, there would be no certainty that the individuals observed in the scenario were the same individual or different individuals. Therefore, it was decided to include all observational surveys. Throughout the rest of the report, the results will be discussed in terms of interview survey data versus observational survey data. It is important to make this distinction as the interview survey data is based on the respondent's own self-identification, while the observational survey data is based on the volunteer's perceptions.

Extrapolation techniques are not incorporated into this report. The 2018 PIT Count reflects only individuals who were counted (through direct observation or interviewed), rather than estimated based on tents or belongings.

It was not feasible to deduplicate the interview and observational data together because, again, the interview data was based on self-identification while the observational data was based on volunteer perception. Therefore, none of the fields from these two different surveys were identical, making it nearly impossible to deduplicate across survey types.

## **Volunteer Recruitment**

A total of 486 volunteers were recruited through the following methods:

- Email blasts;
- Outreach to faith-based organizations;
- Local colleges and universities;
- Press releases published in several print and online newspapers throughout Riverside County;
- PIT Count specific volunteer training sessions held January 3, 2018 to January 19, 2018; and
- Printed flyers distributed at various agencies and collaborative meetings

Interested volunteers were required to register to volunteer for the PIT Count. A web-based survey (SurveyMonkey) was used to keep track of volunteer registrations. PIT Count volunteers provided assistance in the following ways:

- Served as enumerators in the street-based count on January 23, 2018, between 5:30 a.m. and 9:30 a.m.;
- Helped city and county leaders identify locations in Riverside County where homeless individuals and families were known to live and congregate;
- Donated items to be used in the incentive bags given to homeless individuals who were surveyed.

All volunteers were required to complete a 90-minute on-site or online volunteer orientation where they received instructions on how to use the survey tools, conduct the count and on important safety guidelines.

## ESRI Geographic Information System (GIS) Mobile PIT Count Pilot Test

The Point in Time (PIT) homeless census is a huge undertaking that provides critical insights about homelessness in a community and tracks progress towards goals of ending homelessness. Mobile technology provides many advantages over paper forms and clipboards. Since 2016, ESRI's GIS Survey123 application was used to capture homeless locations in Riverside County to include on maps provided to volunteers during the PIT Count.

ESRI has continued to provide innovative solutions to address issues of homelessness. During the 2018 PIT Count, ESRI closely partnered with staff from the Riverside County Department of Public Social Services (DPSS) and the City of Riverside to develop a comprehensive mobile survey pilot test for the Point in Time street-based count. The purpose of piloting the PIT Count using Survey123 in January 2018 was to evaluate the use of Survey123 as the primary data collection tool to be used across Riverside County in 2019.

Survey123 has the potential to replace the traditional paper based forms. The pilot test provided the opportunity to validate the business value and technical performance of the Survey123 application and processes. A successful pilot test would provide Riverside County administrators with full confidence to move ahead in January 2019 with Survey123 as the primary collection tool for its unsheltered, PIT Count.

### 2018 Riverside County Pilot Test Using ESRI Survey123

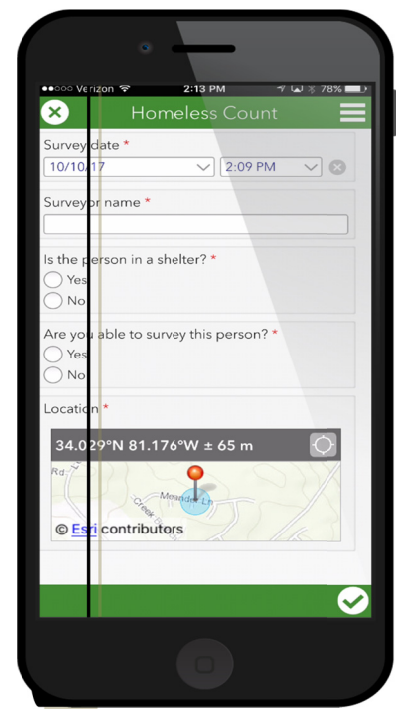
The pilot test consisted of the following highlights:

- Four cities participated in the pilot test (Riverside, Palm Springs, Jurupa Valley, and La Quinta).
- Each mobile survey paralleled a paper survey form to validate accuracy.
- Mobile volunteers were provided with a training video and guide to familiarize themselves with Survey123.
- ESRI staff participated in the field and at the operations Center during the pilot test.
- Count results were monitored in real time using the ESRI Homeless Count Pilot Dashboard.

### Lessons Learned from Mobile Pilot

The following stakeholder and participant feedback was received:

- Mobile survey was well received by participants.
- DPSS benefited by the immediacy of the data for validation purposes.
- Required fields ensured survey completion.
- Additional training prior to the count would be beneficial.
- Survey question sequence needs some improvement.



## Unsheltered Homeless Count

### Street-Based Count

The street-based count took place on January 23, 2018, between 5:30 a.m. and 9:30 a.m. A total of 486 volunteers were divided into small groups and deployed across Riverside County to pre-identified locations where homeless people were known to live and/or congregate. Volunteers served as team leaders, lookouts, or counters and met at one of the deployment centers across the county to receive their team assignments, surveys, supplies, and maps.

Riverside County Sheriff law enforcement teams worked with designated crime analysts to produce maps with the known locations of homeless individuals throughout Riverside County. Based on the analysis of the homeless locations identified and the general coverage areas, city and law enforcement leaders were able to estimate the number of volunteer count teams needed to address the entire coverage areas.

### Service-Based Count

The service-based count took place on January 23, 2018, between 7:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Several weeks prior to the count, DPSS staff compiled a list of agencies that provide services to homeless people throughout Riverside County. The list was compiled using several resources, including: a list of service agencies that the DPSS Homeless Programs Unit had on hand; an internet search; resources of the Riverside County Continuum of Care.

Although efforts were taken to compile a comprehensive list, this list is by no means exhaustive. Once the final list was completed, contact was attempted with each organization. The goal of contacting each organization was to verify the agency name, contact information, operational hours, and to assess each agency's interest level to determine the number of volunteers needed. All agencies that operated between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. on Tuesdays were contacted (or attempts were made). The contacted agencies were classified into four categories: information unconfirmed; willing to administer surveys with agency staff; willing to have volunteers administer surveys at facility; or not interested in participating.

### Behavioral Health Homeless Outreach Count

RUHS-BH teams used the department's Housing Crisis Response teams (30 staff) to assist in the count by canvassing non-city (unincorporated) areas throughout Riverside County. RUHS-BH performed their primary unsheltered counts of non-city areas on the day of the PIT Count, and also performed a follow-up sweep during the seven-day period afterward, as allowed by the HUD methodology<sup>4</sup>

The RUHS-BH staff was also encouraged to count and survey homeless clients who were receiving services at Behavioral Health Clinics throughout the county. The coverage they provided to the non-city areas included: reconnaissance prior to the PIT Count to assess if particular areas had homeless people; and surveying the individuals they found during their reconnaissance at a later date (but within the seven-day window following the PIT Count).

The Housing Crisis Response teams canvassed the areas to assess the presence of individuals living on the streets or in uninhabitable locations. The reconnaissance efforts began the month prior to the PIT Count, increased in frequency over the week before the PIT Count and then continued every day leading up to the PIT Count. If no individuals living on the street were identified in a particular area, RUHS-BH teams returned for one last round of reconnaissance two days prior to the PIT Count date. If RUHS-BH found, or knew of, suspected homeless individuals in a particular area, they returned on the day of the PIT Count (or the seven-day period following the Count date) to administer the survey. On the day of the PIT Count, RUHS-BH teams surveyed the locations with known homeless and then surveyed the remaining locations over the next seven days, ensuring that every known or encountered homeless individual had been counted and/or surveyed. The deduplication method was implemented to account for any individuals who may have been interviewed multiple times.

## Youth Count

Beginning in 2017, HUD mandated that all Continuums of Care (CoC) Programs conduct a Youth PIT Count. A separate Youth PIT Count is required because: youth experiencing homelessness congregate in different locations and at different times than older adults; youth often do not want to be found; and youth do not often think of themselves as being homeless.

The purpose of the Youth PIT Count is to:

- Identify how many youth under age 24 are homeless on a given day in Riverside County;
- Determine the need for youth homeless services; and
- Guide decisions about how to use available resources.

The Youth Count will provide essential data for planning and developing community interventions to meet the goal of preventing and ending homelessness in families, children and youth by the year 2020, as established by the HUD's *Opening Doors* strategy.

Although youth experiencing homelessness or at-risk for homelessness were counted, only those that were "literally homeless" according to HUD guidelines are included in the official unsheltered counts within this report (See Appendix E).

In 2018, The County of Riverside CoC conducted its second official Youth PIT Count and Survey in partnership with the Department of Public Social Services, Riverside University Health System – Behavioral Health TAY Program, and Operation Safehouse. The street-based and service-based counts took place during a four-day window between January 23<sup>rd</sup> and January 26<sup>th</sup>. Partnering agencies recruited internally for youth-friendly volunteers and also accepted a few external volunteers. Each

agency led their own teams of trained, youth-friendly staff and volunteers to conduct the Youth PIT Count and Survey at various locations throughout Riverside County.

## **Sheltered Homeless Count**

As required by HUD, the Sheltered PIT Count involved counting homeless individuals and families who stayed in emergency shelters and transitional housing on the night of January 23, 2018. The sheltered PIT Count was conducted in accordance with HUD’s counting standards and methodology guidance. Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) data was used to generate the sheltered PIT Count and subpopulation data for projects with 100 percent of beds participating in HMIS.

In preparation for the 2018 PIT Count, the HMIS Administrators Council, HMIS participating agencies and users were provided with training and resources on data collection processes and requirements. The training emphasized the users’ responsibilities for ensuring data quality – accuracy, completeness and timeliness – that included entering entry and exit dates into HMIS prior to the assigned deadline.

For non-HMIS participating agencies and domestic violence shelter providers, a survey form was provided to fill in demographic and household data. This information was used to complete the population reporting requirement. The survey included a definition of terms and detailed instructions to ensure data verification and data quality standards were met.

# UNSHELTERED COUNT FINDINGS

## Cities vs. Unincorporated Areas

The unsheltered PIT Count **increased by 2.9% from 2017 (n=1638) to 2018 (n=1685)**. Table 6A below displays the overall data by city or unincorporated area. When presenting any data below, please note that there is a distinction between observational data (based on volunteer perception) and interview data (based on respondent's self-identification), as discussed earlier in the report.

The total column for 2018 represents a summation of the interview and observational data. Both the total count for each city and the respective percentage of the total number of unsheltered homeless people in Riverside County are provided.

Table 6B below indicates all cities and unincorporated communities that experienced an increase in their unsheltered PIT Count. The total unsheltered count of all cities that experienced an increase during the 2018 PIT Count increased by 40.38% from 2017 (n=525) to 2018 (n=737). The total unsheltered count of all county communities increased by 235.71% from 2017 (n=14) to 2018 (n=47).

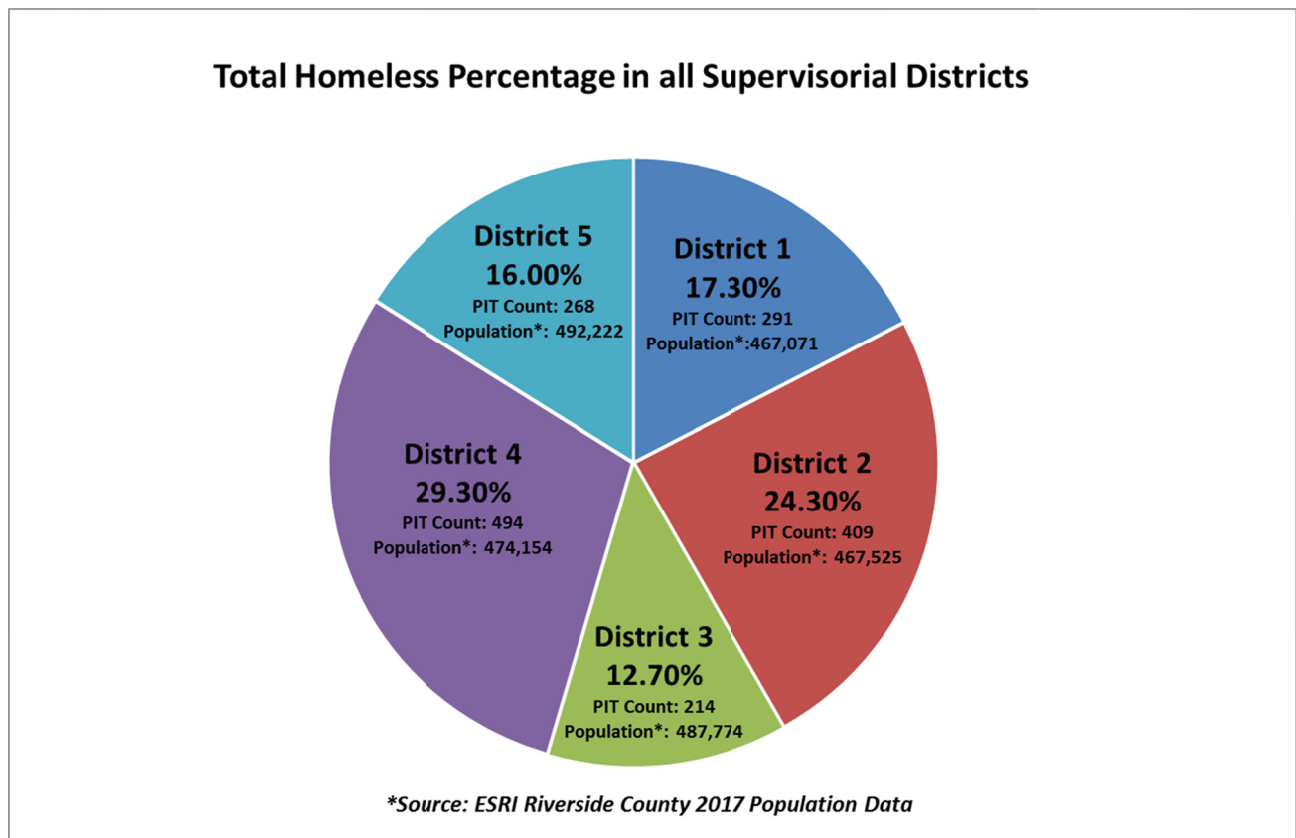

## Supervisory Districts

Geographically, Riverside County is the fourth largest county in the State of California and has an estimated population of more than 2.4 million people as of 2017. Due to its vast geography, Riverside County is divided into five supervisory districts and governed by a Board of Supervisors where one supervisor is elected per district. Tables 7A through 7E identify and compare the number of homeless that were counted in the cities and unincorporated areas of each supervisory district between 2017 and 2018.

Figure 1 details the breakdown and comparison of the total unsheltered PIT Count number by supervisory district. Districts 4 and 2 report the largest portion (29.30% and 24.30% respectively) of unsheltered homeless as compared to the total 2018 Unsheltered PIT Count (n=1685).

**FIRST DISTRICT - Supervisor Kevin Jeffries**

The First Supervisorial District includes the cities of Wildomar, Lake Elsinore, Canyon Lake and most of the City of Riverside. District 1 also covers the unincorporated communities of De Luz, Gavilan Hills, Good Hope, Lake Hills, Lake Mathews, La Cresta, Mead Valley, Meadowbrook, Spring Hills, Temescal Valley, Tenaja Falls, Warm Springs, and Woodcrest. As of the most recent ESRI population data (2017), the total population including designated cities and unincorporated communities in District 1 is 467,071. Table 7A compares the number of homeless that were counted in the cities and unincorporated areas of District 1 between 2017 and 2018. The total number of unsheltered homeless people counted in District 1 **increased by 1%** from 2017 (n=288) to 2018 (n=291) representing 17.30% of the total unsheltered homeless counted during the 2018 PIT Count.

**SECOND DISTRICT – Supervisor John F. Tavaglione**

The Second Supervisorial District includes the cities of Corona, Norco, Jurupa Valley, and Eastvale. It also includes a portion of the city of Riverside, as well as the following City of Riverside neighborhoods: Northside, Downtown, Wood Streets, Magnolia Center, Grand and the northern half of Arlanza and La Sierra Acres. Unincorporated communities within District 2 include Home Gardens, El Cerrito, Coronita and Highgrove. As of the most recent ESRI population data (2017), the total population including designated cities and unincorporated communities in District 2 is 467,525. Table 7B compares the number of homeless that were counted in the cities and unincorporated areas of District 2 between 2017 and 2018. The total number of unsheltered homeless people counted in District 2 **increased by 4%** from 2017 (n=393) to 2018 (n=409) representing 24.30% of the total unsheltered homeless people counted during the 2018 PIT Count.

**THIRD DISTRICT - Supervisor Chuck Washington**

The Third Supervisorial District includes the cities of Hemet, Murrieta, San Jacinto and Temecula, and the unincorporated communities of Aguanga, Anza Valley, Cahuilla, East Hemet, Gilman Hot Springs, Homeland, Idyllwild, Lake Riverside, Mountain Center, Murrieta Hot Springs, Pine Cove, Pine Meadow, the Pinyon Communities, Poppet Flats, Rancho California, Soboba Hot Springs, Valle Vista and Winchester. As of the most recent ESRI population data (2017), the total population including designated cities and unincorporated communities in District 3 is 487,774. Table 7C compares the number of homeless that were counted in the cities and unincorporated areas of District 3 between 2017 and 2018. The total number of unsheltered homeless people counted in District 3 **decreased by 16%** from 2017 (n=256) to 2018 (n=214) representing 12.70% of the total unsheltered homeless people counted during the 2018 PIT Count.

**FOURTH DISTRICT - Supervisor V. Manuel Perez**

The Fourth Supervisorial District is geographically the largest by far, covering the eastern two-thirds of the county. District 4 includes the cities of Blythe, Cathedral City, Coachella, Desert Hot Springs, Indian Wells, Indio, La Quinta, Palm Desert, Palm Springs and Rancho Mirage. The unincorporated communities include Bermuda Dunes, Chiriaco Summit, Colorado River communities, Desert Center, Desert Edge, Eagle Mountain, Indio Hills, Lake Tamarisk, Mecca, Mesa Verde, North Shore, Oasis, Ripley, Sky Valley, Sun City, Palm Desert, Thermal, Thousand Palms and Vista Santa Rosa. As of the most recent ESRI population data (2017), the total population including designated cities and unincorporated communities in District 4 is 474,154. Table 7D compares the number of homeless that were counted in the cities and unincorporated areas of District 4 between 2017 and 2018. The total number of unsheltered homeless people counted in District 4 **decreased by 6%** from 2017 (n=528) to 2018 (n=494) representing 29.30% of the total unsheltered homeless people counted during the 2018 PIT Count.

**FIFTH DISTRICT - Supervisor Marion Ashley**

The Fifth Supervisorial District includes the cities of Banning, Beaumont, Calimesa, Menifee, Moreno Valley and Perris. Unincorporated areas include Banning Bench, Cabazon, Cherry Valley, Desert Hills, Desert Hot Springs, El Nido area, Juniper Flats, Lake Perris, Lakeview, Lakeview Mountains, Mission Springs, Nuevo, North Palm Springs, Painted Hills, Quail Lake, Reche Canyon, San Jacinto Wildlife Reserve, San Timoteo Canyon, Snow Creek, the Sovereign Nation of the Morongo Band of Mission - Indians, Twin Pines, West Garnet, Whitewater and Windy Point. As of the most recent ESRI population data (2017), the total population including designated cities and unincorporated communities in District 5 is 492,222. Table 7E compares the number of homeless that were counted in the cities and unincorporated areas of District 5 between 2017 and 2018. The total number of unsheltered homeless people counted in District 5 **increased by 55%** from 2017 (n=173) to 2018 (n=268) representing 16.0% of the total unsheltered homeless people counted during the 2018 PIT Count.

## Primary Reasons for Becoming Homeless

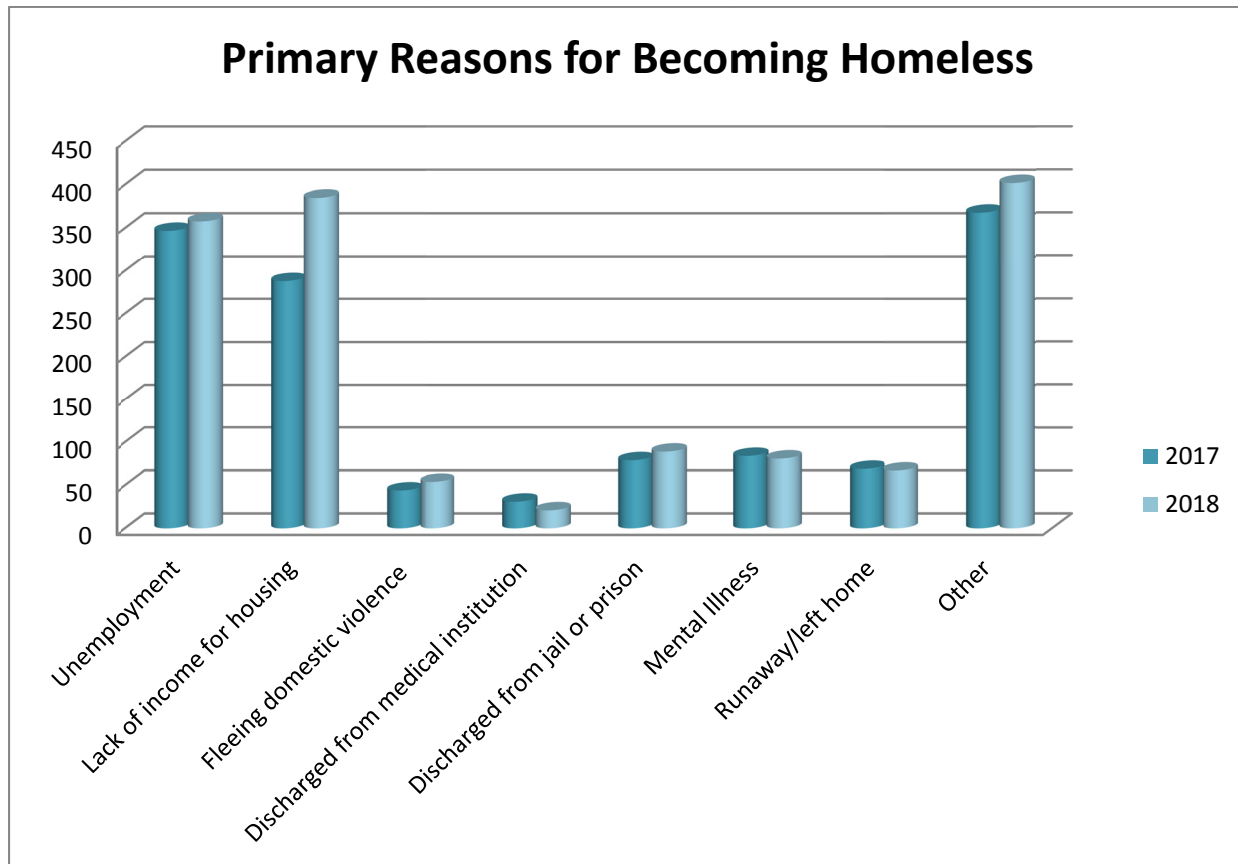
In 2017, at the recommendation of city officials and representatives from the Riverside County Continuum of Care (CoC), a new question was added to the interview survey tool in order capture the primary reasons for individuals becoming homeless within Riverside County. During the 2018 PIT Count, the two most common reasons cited for becoming homeless is lack of income for housing (34%) and unemployment (31%) with significantly more (34%) individuals reporting lack of income in 2018 than in 2017. See Table 8 and Figure 2 below for additional details.

**Figure 2: 2018 Unsheltered Homeless Count – Primary Reasons for Becoming Homeless**



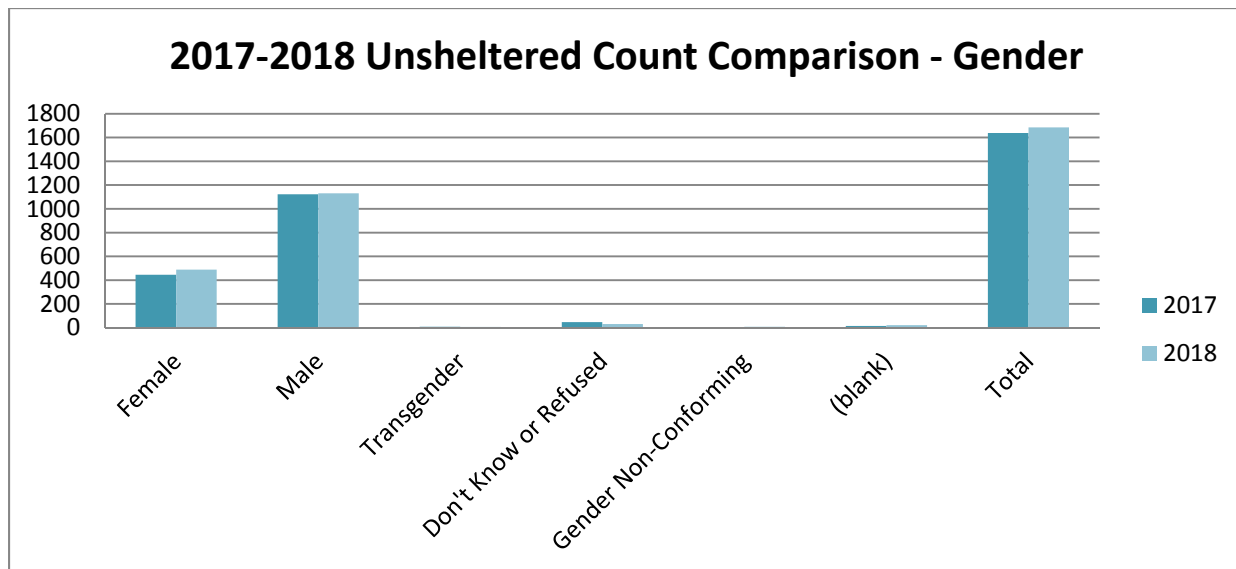
## Gender

Of the 1,685 unsheltered homeless people, more than half (67%) of these individuals were men (n = 1131) and one-third (29%) of these individuals were female (n=488). The gender distribution from 2017 to 2018 relatively remains the same. See Table 9 and Figure 3 below for full details.

## Race and Ethnicity

More than half (55%) of the unsheltered homeless population were White (n=934), while one in ten (13%) individuals were Black or African Americans (n=216). Only one percent (1.13%) of the unsheltered homeless population was Asian (n=19), while six percent (6.11%) were American Indian or Alaska Native (n=103) and nearly two percent (1.54%) were Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander (n=26). The three race groups with the largest increases from 2017 to 2018 were Asian (90%), American Indian or Alaska Native (16%) and Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander (30%). (See table 10 below).

In terms of ethnicity, almost one in three homeless individuals was Hispanic or Latino during the 2018 PIT Count. (See table and Figure 4 below).

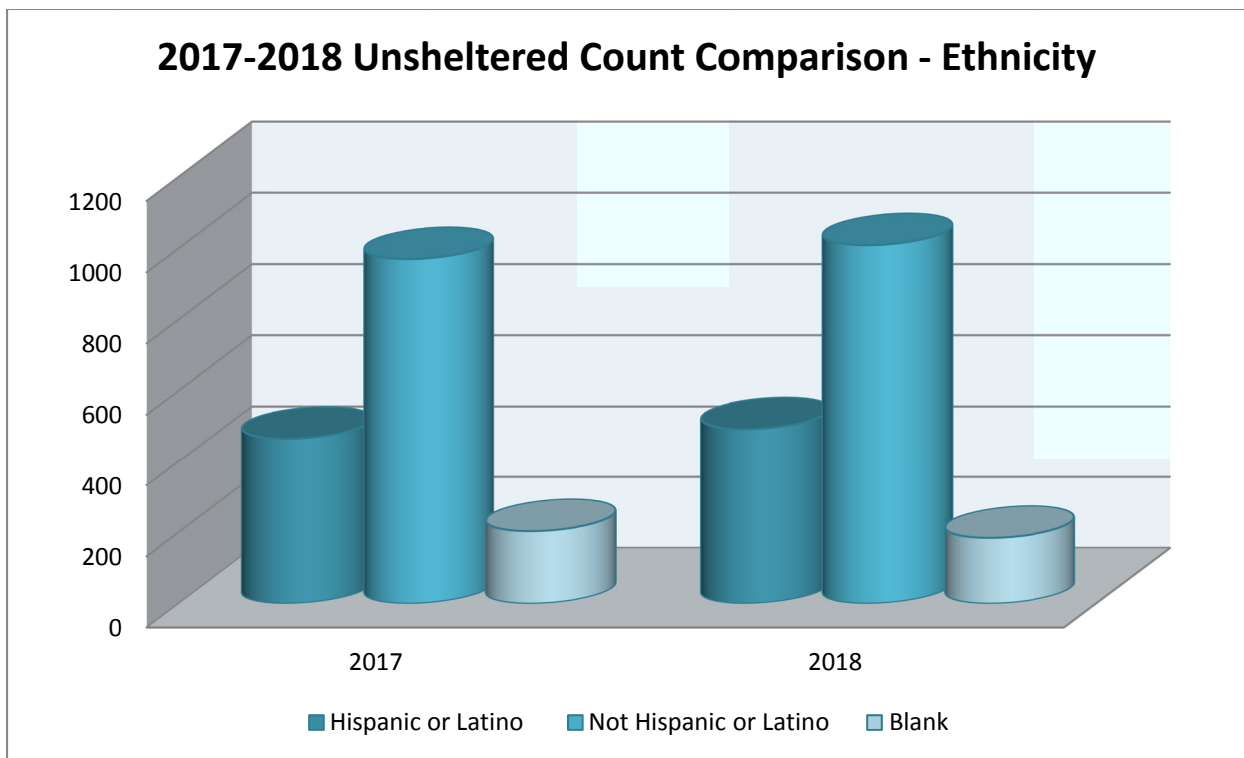

## Age

Table 12 compares the 2017 to the 2018 age subpopulation counts based on predefined age ranges. The number of unsheltered homeless children under the age of 18 decreased by 73.33% from 2017 (n=15) to 2018 (n=4). However, the unsheltered homeless senior age range 70-79 increased by 84.62% from 2017 (n=13) to 2018 (n=24).

## Youth

Due to the hidden nature of youth homelessness, there is limited data on unaccompanied children and transitional age youth experiencing homelessness. Young people experiencing homelessness may have a more difficult time accessing services, including shelter, medical care, and employment due to the stigma of their situation and the lack of knowledge of available resources targeted to young people. The County of Riverside implemented a supplemental youth count and survey in 2017 to gather additional data on unaccompanied children and youth.

During the 2018 PIT Count, among the unsheltered homeless population, 11% were considered homeless youth under the age of 25 (n = 181) using HUD's "literally homeless" definition. This total reflects the number of unaccompanied homeless youth who were not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian. Table 13 provides a breakdown of these unsheltered youth subpopulations.

## Elderly

During the 2018 PIT Count, among the unsheltered homeless population, 18% of the homeless adults were age 62 or higher (n = 145). The 2017 and 2018 PIT Count data indicate that the number of elderly unsheltered homeless individuals is increasing in Riverside County. The elderly population increased by almost 18% from 2017 (n=123) to 2018 (n=145) as indicated in table 14 below. Further analysis is required to determine if the elderly population is aging into homelessness or whether the number of seniors becoming homeless is increasing.

In the nation, there were 306,000 people over age 50 living on the streets in 2014, based on the most recent data available. This is a 20 percent increase since 2007, according to HUD. This elderly group now makes up 31 percent of the nation's homeless population<sup>1</sup>. The number of homeless elderly in the nation is expected to grow to nearly 100,000 in 2050 from 58,000 in 2020, according to the Homelessness Research Institute<sup>2</sup>.

## Veterans

In 2017, Riverside County was one of the first counties in the nation to end homelessness among veterans using the rigorous measures and benchmarks established by HUD and the U.S. Department of Veteran Affairs (VA). The CoC continues to strategically link veterans with appropriate housing. County-wide veteran outreach teams continue to work closely with the VA to identify, assess and engage all unsheltered vets.

Among the 2018 unsheltered homeless population (interview surveys), 6% self-reported to be veterans (n=99). Of these veterans, 2% were chronically homeless (n=33) and 2% also reported receiving benefits (n=30). It is important to recognize that the PIT methodology includes the self-reporting of information from individuals experiencing homelessness. No verification was completed to determine actual veteran status. Table 15 compares the 2017 to the 2018 veteran and chronically homeless veterans that were counted.

On the day of the PIT Count, volunteers engaged unsheltered veterans for immediate housing on the day of the count. The County of Riverside Housing Authority (CRHA) in collaboration with the VA, DPSS and other veteran service providers, provided transportation, intake and assessment services, emergency shelter and additional resources to interested veterans.

## Subpopulations

Table 16 compares the 2017 to the 2018 subpopulation counts. The number of chronically homeless individuals increased by 13.49% from 2017 (n=341) to 2018 (n=387). Those who reported drug use increased by 5.42% from 2017 (n=461) to 2018 (486); PTSD increased by 11.94% from 2017 (n=268) to 2018 (n=300); and physical disability increased by 11.33% from 2017 (n=362) to 2018 (n=403). In 2018, HUD revised the domestic violence survey question to capture current domestic violence (DV) as opposed to past occurrences of DV which were allowed in previous years. This change may possibly account for the 65.60% decrease from 2017 (n=282) to 2018 (n=97).

## Criminal Justice System

Homelessness and incarceration are not mutually exclusive and often correspond with one another. Individuals who are young, veterans, or experiencing mental health issues are often struggling to financially sustain themselves, and may also be more likely to participate in criminal activity. In 2018, a new question was added to the survey tool to capture the respondents experience with the criminal justice system. Table 17 below details the responses to this new question. Among survey respondents, 13 percent (n=160) reported being released from jail or prison within the past 90 days; 5 percent (n=63) said they were released on probation and 1 percent (n=13) were released on parole. Nine percent (n=112) reported being released from jail or prison within the past 12 months. Of this population, 3 percent (n=34) were released on probation and less than 1 percent (n=5) were released on parole.

A total of 631 homeless individuals were counted during the 2018 Sheltered PIT Count. These individuals stayed in emergency shelters (including domestic violence shelters and hotel/motel vouchers) and transitional housing. The 2018 total represents a **17.8% decrease** from the 2017 sheltered count (n = 768).

Most of the sheltered subpopulations experienced a decrease during the 2018 PIT Count. The subpopulations that experienced the most significant count decreases were mental health problems (29.13%), veterans (35.09%), substance users (10.16%), and minor youth (10.91%).

In 2018, HUD revised the domestic violence survey question to capture current domestic violence (DV) as opposed to past occurrences of DV which were allowed in previous years. This change could possibly account for the 82.61% decrease from 2017 (n=115) to 2018 (n=20). See Table 20 below regarding the 2017 to the 2018 sheltered subpopulation comparison.

## CONCLUSION

The 2018 PIT Count unsheltered methodology consisted of a street-based count, and a service-based count. The sheltered count methodology consisted of data extracted from the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) to count sheltered homeless individuals on the night of January 22, 2018.

A total of 1,685 unsheltered homeless individuals and a sheltered count of 631 (**total homeless = 2,316**) were identified in Riverside County during the 2018 Point-In-Time Homeless Count on January 23, 2018. In contrast, during the 2017 PIT Count, 1,638 unsheltered and 768 sheltered homeless individuals (total homeless = 2,406) were identified. Therefore, there was a **3.7%** decrease in the overall total number of homeless people counted from 2017 to 2018 (**2.9%** increase in unsheltered homeless; **17.8%** decrease in sheltered homeless). Among the 1,685 unsheltered individuals counted in 2018, 1,239 were interviewed and 446 were observed.

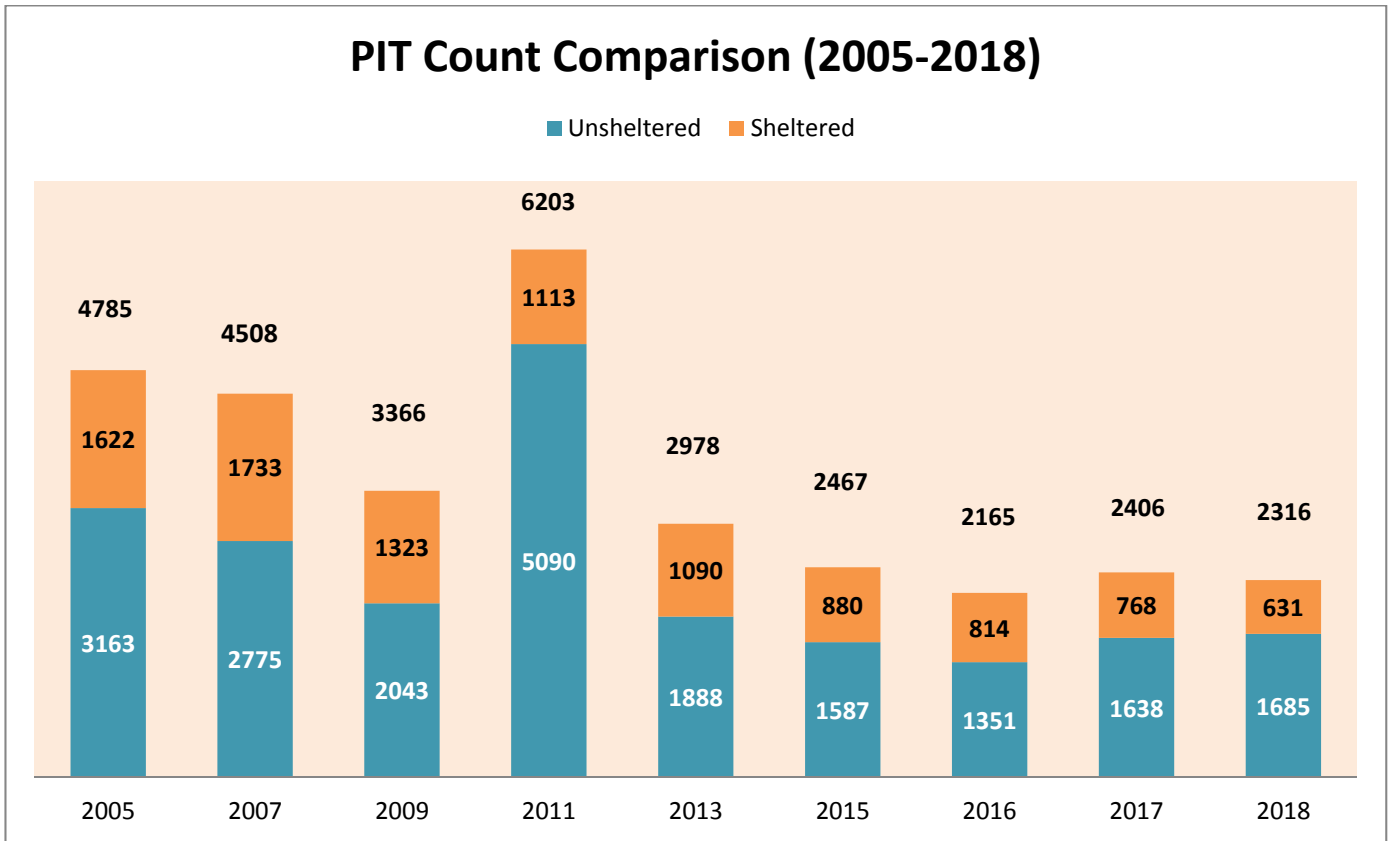
***The increase in the unsheltered 2018 PIT Count versus the 2017 PIT Count reflects an actual increase in our homeless unsheltered population. As depicted in figure 6 below, unsheltered PIT Count numbers have continued to decline since 2013 with the exception of a 21.2% increase in 2017 and a slight 2.9% increase in 2018. Overall, Riverside County has decreased total homelessness by more than half (52%) from 2005 to 2018.***

The increase in the size of the unsheltered homeless population and most subpopulations may obscure the fact that many individuals' lives have been changed for the better through Riverside County's homeless initiatives. It is important to consider the results of the 2018 Count within the context of local efforts to move individuals and families out of homelessness that include creating new permanent housing beds with supportive services. Through innovative and effective housing programs and services, Riverside County remains committed to moving persons experiencing homelessness into permanent housing.

The completion of the 2018 Homeless Point-in-Time Count provides required data for federal funding for the Riverside County Continuum of Care (CoC). The data presented in the 2018 Homeless Point-in-Time Count and Survey report will continue to be used by the CoC planning bodies and the City and County of Riverside and other organizations to inform additional outreach, service planning, and policy decision-making over the next year as they continue to address homelessness.

# CHALLENGES, LIMITATIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

## Incomplete or Missing Information on Interview Surveys

During the 2018 PIT Count, many of the paper surveys had missing or incomplete data that was critical to making city location assignments based on the city, zip code and location description fields. The incomplete information also impacted the ability to determine chronically homelessness status and other subpopulation criteria. A concerted effort was made to contact City PIT Count leaders, law enforcement personnel and volunteers to reconcile the missing and incomplete information.

In 2019, when Riverside County moves toward implementing a 100 percent mobile survey deployment, the issue of missing and incomplete data will be mostly resolved because mobile users will not be allowed to skip required data fields during the data collection process. Locations will be captured via an actual GPS location point instead of zip code only. This capability will eliminate the issue of surveys being erroneously assigned to cities and/or unincorporated county areas.

## Number of Observational Surveys

During the 2018 PIT Count, 26 percent of the returned surveys were observational survey tools (n=446). Although the number of observational surveys decreased between 2017 and 2018 by 13 percent, Riverside County is committed to continue reducing the number of observational surveys in 2019.

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) makes provisions for using an observational survey instead of an interview survey in the following situations:

- PIT Count volunteer is unable to enter the location to conduct a survey.
- PIT Count volunteer cannot conduct a survey (person refused to answer questions, language or other issues).
- PIT Count volunteer does not wish to disturb people while they are sleeping.

However, due to the limited amount of information collected on the observational survey and the fact that it includes the volunteer's perspective as opposed to the homeless individual's response, it makes the deduplication process challenging. Even though every effort is made to remove duplicates, there is no guarantee that some of the individuals observed may or may not have been interviewed at another time during the PIT Count. To address this issue, this year's PIT Count methodology was revised to disallow observational surveys during the seven-day follow-up count in city jurisdictions. The PIT Count Planning Team also recommends placing a greater emphasis on using the interview survey instead of the observational surveys as much as possible.

## Youth Count

The PIT Count Planning Team, and participating youth partner agencies lacked adequate resources to conduct a separate Youth Count to cover the entire geography within Riverside County. Unaccompanied homeless youth are often difficult to find because they tend to: (a) congregate at different times and places than older adults; (b) refuse (or are unaware of) social service programs and agencies; and (c) do not want to be found as they may be fleeing abuse or the foster care system.

Although a separate Youth Count was conducted in 2018, the PIT Count Planning Team met with youth service agencies to identify locations of homeless youth. For future Youth Counts, the PIT Count Planning Team recommends early and ongoing collaboration and planning with youth service agencies to facilitate the planning and implementation of a more comprehensive Youth PIT Count across Riverside County.

## Sheltered Count

The sheltered count primarily consisted of extracting data from the HMIS database. However, not all shelters participate in HMIS (such as, providers for victims of domestic violence and hotel/motel vouchers). Some non-HMIS participating agencies do not use a database system to track their data. Instead, they rely on daily written logs and sign-in-sheets to provide the count demographics and household information.

### 5 MYTHS about PIT COUNTS

February 2014

#### Myth 1: Point-in-Time counts do not count every homeless person and therefore are inaccurate.

**PIT counts are a solid count of people experiencing homelessness in shelters, transitional housing, and on the street, in cars, in abandoned buildings, and in other places not intended for human habitation.**

People experiencing homelessness in unsheltered locations are particularly difficult to find and enumerate. The PIT counts do miss people, as do most censuses. Nevertheless, PIT counts are important. They are the ONLY measure that captures the scope of people experiencing homelessness who are unsheltered – living on the streets, in cars, in abandoned buildings, and other places not meant for human habitation. And, by using the same methodology every year, PIT counts allow a community to assess the relative size of the homeless population over time.

#### Myth 2: Other national statistics contradict the data presented in Point-in-Time counts.

**There are several national data sources on homelessness, but they do not cover the same population over the same time period, and subsequently cannot be directly compared to the PIT count.**

PIT counts cover all people sheltered in homeless programs and unsheltered on a given night. They are conducted in every community, and are required by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). HUD also requires communities to collect data on people in homeless programs over the course of a year via Homeless Management Information Systems (HMIS). The Department of Education (Education) counts children who are enrolled in school and living in shelter, unsheltered situations, hotels and motels, and doubled up with family or friends during the school year. The U.S. Census Bureau includes a measure for people experiencing homelessness in the decennial Census.

These measures examine different populations over different time periods using different methodologies and cannot be directly compared. They have, however, tended to show similar trends over time. For example, between 2012 and 2013, both the PIT count and the Education data showed that the number of people who live in shelters, transitional housing, and unsheltered has gone down.

**Myth 3: Point-in-Time counts are meant to provide data on everyone who is homeless during a year.**

**PIT counts are intended to provide a snapshot of how many people are homeless on a given night.**

PIT counts provide the number of people living in emergency shelters, transitional housing, and unsheltered locations in a community. They provide little detailed information about the characteristics of who experiences homelessness over time in a community. Communities can glean more information on homelessness over the course of a year by examining the data collected in HMIS.

Data from HMIS, however, does not provide information about the scope of unsheltered homelessness. PIT counts are uniquely valuable in that respect.

**Myth 4: Fluctuations in the Point-in-Time counts simply reflect fluctuations in the number of shelter beds – not in the number of homeless people.**

**The PIT counts reflect the interaction among people in beds, people unsheltered, and utilization of beds.**

PIT counts can be affected by the number of beds, but they also count people who are not sheltered reflecting the entire population of people who are literally homeless. PIT counts also reflect the varying utilization of beds (i.e., they sometimes go unused). For example, in 2013 the number of shelter and transitional housing beds went down, but the number of people in those beds went up meaning vacancy was reduced.

**Myth 5: If the Point-in-Time count is down, it means that there is enough affordable housing in the community.**

**The PIT describes how the homeless system is managing people's experience of the shortage of affordable housing – not the availability of that housing.**

The PIT count does not describe the affordable housing crisis. For that, a community should examine how many affordable units there are for the number of extremely low income households, the number of households that are doubled up, and the percentage of income that people pay for rent, among other things. Data on these measures is available from HUD and the U.S. Census Bureau.

A Point-in-Time count is a one-night, unduplicated count of people experiencing homelessness in a Continuum of Care (CoC). HUD requires that CoCs count their sheltered homeless population every year. They require that CoCs count their unsheltered homeless population every other year, on odd numbered calendar years. In 2012, despite not being required, 67 percent of CoCs conducted an unsheltered count. CoCs are expected to conduct their count during the last 10 days of January.

## POINT-IN-TIME HOMELESS COUNT

The Point-in-Time (PIT) Count is a count and survey of Riverside County's sheltered and unsheltered homeless population. The Department of Public Social Services (DPSS) partners with the County of Riverside Continuum of Care (CoC) to conduct this federally mandated annual count during the last 10 days in January. PIT focuses on counting homeless persons who are **unsheltered** with a primary nighttime residence is a public place not designated for human habitation; and **sheltered** in emergency shelter, transitional housing, and Safe Havens on a single night.

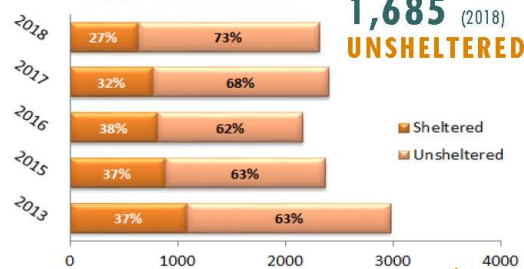

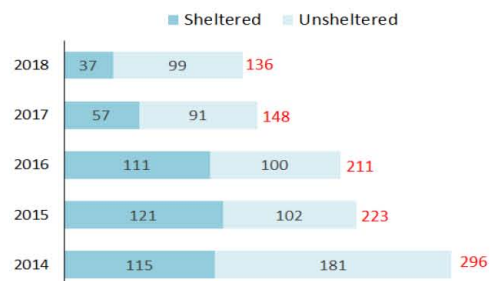

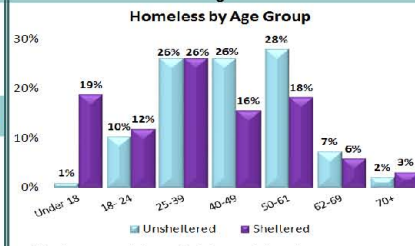
